Match background

A third successive home win on matchday five sent Bayer 04 Leverkusen through to the UEFA Champions League last 16 for the first time in seven years. Their final challenge at this stage is to finish as Group E winners and they will be hopeful of picking up their first away points at bottom side KRC Genk.

- The German team owe their position to the win against Chelsea FC last time out when Manuel Friedrich scored in added time after Eren Derdiyok had wiped out Didier Drogba's opener.
- On the same night Genk slipped to a 7-0 reverse at Valencia CF and, though the Belgian outfit are certain to finish fourth, they will be seeking a first victory to end their European campaign on a high.
- The matchday two meeting between these teams – their first competitive encounter – ended 2-0 to Leverkusen, with Lars Bender's first goal in European competition putting the German side on their way. Substitute Michael Ballack then struck in added time to secure the points.
- On their return to the competition after nine years, Genk opened with a goalless draw at home to Valencia but after the defeat in Leverkusen they went down 5-0 at Chelsea. Some pride was restored back in Belgium with a 1-1 draw against the London team, meaning Mario Been's side have drawn both home games so far and conceded 14 without scoring in losing all three away matches.
- On matchday one Leverkusen lost 2-0 at Chelsea and in the two games with Valencia they won 2-1 at the BayArena but went down 3-1 in Spain. They have won all three home matches but lost both away.

Match background

- The sides came face to face for a friendly on 23 July this year. Leverkusen won 4-1, Derdiyok scoring a hat-trick.
- Genk have had some interesting results at home to German opponents, winning the first such fixture 5-0 against MSV Duisburg in the 1998/99 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup first round. The other two they lost – 5-2 against SV Werder Bremen in the 2000/01 UEFA Cup second round and 1-0 against Borussia Dortmund in the 2004 UEFA Intertoto Cup third round.
- In four games against Belgian opponents Leverkusen have a record showing three wins and a draw. Before this season their most recent contest, a 2006/07 UEFA Cup group stage away game against Club Brugge KV, ended 1-1.
- The other matches – against K. Lierse SK in the 1997/98 UEFA Champions League group stage – were won 1-0 at home and 2-0 away.

Team ties

- Been scored the second goal for Feyenoord in a 2-2 draw with Leverkusen in a 1987/88 UEFA Cup third round tie. Feyenoord lost the away leg 1-0 against a team who went on to win that season's competition.
- Daniel Pudil and Michal Kadlec are international team-mates with the Czech Republic.
- In a 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifier in Tel Aviv in September 2008, Tranquillo Barnetta played for Switzerland in a 2-2 draw against Israel, who brought on Elyaniv Barda after an hour.
- The return game in Basle 13 months later ended goalless. Derdiyok and Barnetta featured for Switzerland while Barda played for Israel.
- André Schürrle scored Germany's second goal in the 3-1 UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying win against Marvin Ogunjimi's Belgium on 11 October.
- Germany beat Belgium 2-0 in an August 2008 friendly in Nuremberg. Simon Rolfes was in the German side while Thomas Buffel and Stijn Huysegems appeared as substitutes for the visitors.
- Rolfes was a substitute for Germany as they lost 3-0 to the Czech Republic in a UEFA EURO 2008 qualifier played in Munich in October 2007. Pudil started for the winning team.

UEFA milestones

- The 7-0 defeat at Valencia CF on matchday five was Genk's heaviest in UEFA competition, eclipsing a 6-0 UEFA Champions League first group stage loss to Real Madrid CF in September 2002.

- Genk have scored only one goal, fewer than any other side; their tally of 15 conceded is the joint highest along with GNK Dinamo Zagreb.

- Mario Been's side suffered their third successive defeat – all away – a run that has seen them concede 11 goals and score none. Genk are four matches unbeaten at home, though.
- It was Genk's fifth loss in 16 league games this season; one more than they suffered all last term in the 30-match regular season.
- Starting with their 2-0 reverse at Leverkusen on matchday two, Genk have lost eight of their last 13 games.
- Genk are on 23 points in the First League; at this stage last term they had 36 and were two points clear at the summit.
- Of the 24 league goals Genk have conceded this season, 17 have come in the second half of games.
- Kevin De Bruyne struck his first professional hat-trick as Genk recovered from 4-2 down to beat Club Brugge KV 5-4 on 29 October.
- Dániel Tózsér struck the only goal as Genk claimed their first Belgian Super Cup at the sixth attempt on 21 July, beating R. Standard de Liège despite playing over an hour with ten men after Jelle Vossen's dismissal.

Injury news

- De Bruyne has been ruled out for three weeks after breaking his toe on Friday.
- Khaleem Hyland missed the Beerschot game after injuring his foot in training last week; Vossen was out with flu.
- Abel Masuero has been out since picking up a calf muscle injury in training on 25 October.
- David Hubert (stomach, out since 28 September) and Jeroen Simaey (broken toe, 5 October) have been sidelined.
- Torben Joneleit could be out until April after tearing knee ligaments against KV Mechelen on 27 August.

Miscellaneous

- On 30 November, Been signed a new contract which ties him to Genk until summer 2014. He took the reins on 30 August, 12 days after Frank Vercauteren's departure for United Arab Emirates outfit Al-Jazira Club.
- Anthony Vanden Borre made his first start for Belgium in over two years in a 2-1 friendly win against Romania on 11 November.
- Marvin Ogunjimi, who was due to join RCD Mallorca on 7 December, was released to train with the Spanish club early, although he cannot play for them before January.

- Eren Derdiyok's fifth goal in three games set Robin Dutt's side on course for a victory that extended their unbeaten run to five matches – a season high.
- Leverkusen kept only their fourth clean sheets in 16 matches in all competitions.
- On 26 November Derdiyok – scorer of the equaliser against Chelsea FC three days earlier – struck all Leverkusen's goals in a 3-3 draw at Hertha BSC Berlin. It was his first hat-trick since a treble for FC Basel 1893 away to FC Thun on 2 March 2008.
- Leverkusen were 2-0 down inside 17 minutes at Hertha, with Ömer scoring his second own goal of the season. It could have been worse: Bernd Leno denied Levan Kobiashvili from the spot on five minutes.

Injury news

- Ömer was withdrawn at half-time against Hertha after picking up a back injury and missed the Hoffenheim win.
- Bastian Oczipka, who had been out since breaking an ankle on loan at FC St Pauli in February, made his Leverkusen debut against 1. FC Kaiserslautern on 18 November. He joined the club aged ten in 1999.
- Summer signing Michael Ortega, yet to make his debut for the club after injuring his left knee on 5 September, has been an unused substitute for Leverkusen's past three games.
- Karim Bellarabi (out since 2 November) and Hanno Balitsch (9 November) have been sidelined with thigh injuries.
- Renato Augusto has not played since undergoing knee surgery in late October.
- First-choice goalkeeper René Adler has been sidelined since undergoing knee surgery in mid-July.
- Tranquillo Barnetta has not played since 4 June because of a persistent right knee problem.

Miscellaneous

- On 30 November, Leverkusen confirmed the signing of goalkeeper Leno from VfB Stuttgart. The 19-year-old, who joined on a four-month loan in August, has committed until summer 2017.
- On 23 November, Leverkusen announced that centre-back Philipp Wollscheid, 22, will join from 1. FC Nürnberg next summer on a five-year deal.
- Ömer made his Turkey debut in a 0-0 play-off draw in Croatia on 15 November. They had lost the first leg 3-0.

Head coach

KRC Genk: Mario Been

Date of birth: 11 December 1963

Nationality: Dutch

Playing career: Feyenoord, Pisa Calcio, Roda JC, sc Heerenveen, FC Tirol Innsbruck, SBV Excelsior

Coaching career: Feyenoord (assistant), SBV Excelsior, Trinidad & Tobago (assistant), NEC Nijmegen, Feyenoord, KRC Genk

- Developed in Feyenoord's youth department, the attacking midfielder played in the first team from 1982; his greatest success came in 1984 when he helped the Rotterdam giants, whose side included Johan Cruyff and Ruud Gullit, to the Dutch double, also winning the country's Talent of the Year prize and making his only appearance for the Netherlands in a friendly against Austria.
- As a skilled playmaker who also possessed a powerful shot, he earned the nickname Mariodona at Feyenoord; left in 1988 for Pisa, and had spells with Roda, Heerenveen and Tirol Innsbruck before ending his career in 1995 back in Rotterdam with Excelsior.
- In 2000 he became Bert van Marwijk's assistant at Feyenoord, winning the UEFA Cup in 2002; left in 2004 and the following year took over at Excelsior, whom he guided to promotion as second division champions in his first season.
- Worked as Leo Beenhakker's assistant with Trinidad & Tobago at the 2006 FIFA World Cup before taking charge of NEC, leading the club to fifth place in the Eredivisie in 2007/08 and reaching the round of 32 of the following season's UEFA Cup.
- Unable to resist the lure of Feyenoord, where he returned in summer 2009; finished fourth and reached the Dutch Cup final in his first season but his second campaign included a club record 10-0 defeat by PSV Eindhoven. Been stepped down in July 2011 but was back in football the following month, taking charge of Genk.

Bayer 04 Leverkusen: Robin Dutt

Date of birth: 24 January 1965

Nationality: German

Coaching career: TSG Leonberg (player-coach), TSF Ditzingen, Stuttgarter Kickers (reserves), Stuttgarter Kickers, SC Freiburg, Bayer 04 Leverkusen

- One of the new breed of German coaches whose second career has eclipsed modest playing days, Dutt rose through the ranks of several clubs in southern Germany as he methodically learned his trade.
- From 1995 to 1999 he was player-coach at non-league Leonberg, whom he led to promotion before taking over Ditzingen's reserves, becoming coach of their first team, then in the fourth tier, in 2000. Two years later accepted the offer to take charge of the reserve side of former Bundesliga outfit Stuttgarter Kickers, stepping up to the third tier and the first team a year later.
- Awarded the UEFA Pro Licence as top of his class in 2005, the same year he guided Stuttgarter Kickers to the first of successive victories in the regional Württemberg Cup. Thus qualified for the first round of the national trophy, his side duly knocked out Hamburger SV in September 2006.
- Having already been linked with several higher-profile clubs, Dutt took over Freiburg in summer 2007, finishing fifth in the 2. Bundesliga in his first season before winning the division, and promotion to the top flight, a year later.
- Took Freiburg to 14th position in the Bundesliga in 2009/10 and led the club to sixth place at the halfway stage of the following campaign; they eventually finished ninth, earning Dutt the chance to take charge of Leverkusen.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

- Holders FC Barcelona have avoided becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).
- In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on matchday one at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 1-1 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Barcelona and Manchester United FC have both finished as group winners on 12 occasions, one more than Real Madrid.
- Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).
- Twelve teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including MŠK Žilina and FK Partizan in 2010/11. The other ten are: Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), Anderlecht (2004/05), Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).
- Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.
- MŠK Žilina conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2010/11, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Debrecen (2009/10), Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal CF (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on matchday three of the same campaign.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
