## Match background

---

Atlético de Madrid and Porto have both become UEFA Champions League knockout regulars in recent years but will know the importance of making a positive start to the 2020/21 competition.

- With Liverpool and AC Milan also involved in Group B, Atleti and Porto will both be keen to hit the ground running at the Estadio Metropolitano in what is their first meeting since 2013.

### Previous meetings

- All six of the sides' past contests have come in the UEFA Champions League, each recording two victories, with Porto scoring eight goals, two more than Atlético.
- The Spanish side came out on top in both of their meetings with Porto in the 2013/14 competition. Second-half goals from Diego Godín (58) and Arda Turan (86) secured a 2-1 comeback victory in Portugal on Matchday 2 after Jackson Martínez's 16th-minute opener for Porto; Raúl García (14) and Diego Costa (37) were on target for group winners Atleti at their former Estadio Vicente Calderón home on Matchday 6, a result that left Porto third in the section.
- Porto had come out on top when the sides were in the same group in 2009/10, late goals from Radamel Falcao (75) – later of Atlético – and Rolando (82) securing a Matchday 2 victory in Portugal; Falcao (14) was again on target in Madrid in between goals from team-mates Bruno Alves (2) and Hulk (76) as Porto finished second in the section behind Chelsea. Atlético were third on three points but went on to win the inaugural UEFA Europa League.
- The Portuguese side also got the better of Atlético in the 2008/09 round of 16, two first-leg goals from Lisandro López (22, 72) in a 2-2 draw in Madrid proving crucial. Porto went through on away goals after the second game in Portugal ended scoreless.

### Form guide

#### Atlético

- Champions of Spain for the 11th time in 2020/21, Atlético finished two points ahead of Real Madrid in the final Liga standings to give them their second league championship under Diego Simeone, who also guided them to the title in 2013/14.
- This is Atlético's 12th UEFA Champions League group campaign, level with Valencia; only Barcelona and Real Madrid (both 26 participations) have featured more among Spanish sides.
- All but two of Atleti's previous 11 group appearances have extended into the knockout stages; this is their ninth successive group campaign.
- Last season, Simeone's side finished second in their section behind holders Bayern, picking up nine points. They were the only side to deny Bayern victory in Group A, the 1-1 draw in Madrid on Matchday 5 ending the German club's record run of UEFA Champions League victories at 15.
- Atlético then lost 1-0 against Chelsea in the first leg of their round of 16 tie, a game that was played in Bucharest, before a 2-0 defeat in London.
- The Madrid club have reached the quarter-finals or better in five of their last eight UEFA Champions League campaigns – all under Simeone.
- Atlético have lost six of their last 14 European matches (W5 D3).
- The Rojiblancos have reached two UEFA Champions League and three UEFA Europa League finals in the last 12 seasons.
- A 2-1 loss to Chelsea on Matchday 2 in 2017/18 is Atlético's only defeat in the last 29 European games in their own stadium (W22 D6).
- Atlético's last meeting with Portuguese opponents came in the quarter-finals of their victorious 2017/18 UEFA Europa League campaign, when goals from Koke (1) and Antoine Griezmann (40) secured a 2-0 first-leg win in Madrid, a result that took Simeone's side through despite a subsequent 1-0 loss in Lisbon.
- Atlético have won nine of their 20 UEFA competition matches against Portuguese clubs (D4 L7) and six of the ten in Madrid (D2 L2).

#### Porto

- This is Porto's 25th UEFA Champions League group campaign, fewer only than Real Madrid and Barcelona (both 26).
- The Portuguese side have qualified for the last 16 on each of their last four appearances in the group stage.
- In 2020/21, Porto finished second in Group C behind Manchester City and ahead of Olympiacos and Marseille. They lost their first game, 3-1 in Manchester, but then remained unbeaten and kept clean sheets in each of the next five

(W4 D1).

- In the round of 16, Porto were 2-1 winners at home to Juventus in the first leg, going through on away goals after a 3-2 extra-time defeat in Turin with Sérgio Oliveira's 115th-minute free-kick – his second goal of the game – proving decisive.
- Both legs of the quarter-final against Chelsea were played in Seville, the English club winning the first leg 2-0 and going through despite a 1-0 second-leg defeat.
- Porto finished second in the 2020/21 Portuguese Liga, five points behind champions Sporting CP.
- Porto have not faced Spanish opposition since the 2014/15 group stage, when they beat Athletic Club 2-1 at home – Héctor Herrera, now of Atlético, scoring their first goal – and 2-0 in Bilbao. That was just their sixth win away to Spanish hosts in their 22nd fixture (D2 L14).

- Atlético are still unbeaten in this season's Liga (W3 D1). They were 2-1 comeback winners at Espanyol on Sunday thanks to late goals from Yannick Carrasco (79) and Thomas Lemar (90+9).
- Diego Simeone's side won 2-1 at Celta Vigo on the opening day before a 1-0 home success against Elche.
- The Rojiblancos then snatched a last-gasp 2-2 draw at home to Villarreal on 29 August thanks to an own goal in the fifth minute of stoppage time.
- Antoine Griezmann, who rejoined Atleti on the final day of the transfer window, scored three times in as many 2022



FIFA World Cup qualifying appearances for France during September's international break. He found the net in a 1-1 draw at home to Bosnia and Herzegovina on 1 September and got both goals in a 2-0 win at home to Finland six days later.

- Ángel Correa, who has scored three goals in four games for Atleti this season, was also on target in Argentina's 3-1 victory away to Venezuela on 2 September.
- Kieran Trippier featured in five of England's games, including the final, as they finished runners-up at UEFA EURO 2020.
- Koke started all six of Spain's UEFA EURO 2020 games as they reached the semi-finals. Marcos Llorente was also in the squad, playing four times.
- Luis Suárez suffered a knee injury in the draw at Villarreal but started on Sunday.
- João Félix made his first appearance of the season on Sunday, coming on as a substitute after recovering from an ankle injury; Héctor Herrera (muscle) is still to feature although he was on the bench at the weekend.

## Porto

- Porto are still unbeaten in this season's Portuguese Liga (W3 D2), scoring nine goals and conceding only three in their five matches. They drew 1-1 at champions Sporting CP on Saturday, Luis Díaz scoring their equaliser and Porto holding on despite Toni Martínez's late red card.
- Sérgio Conceição's side beat Belenenses 2-0 at home in their opening fixture before a 2-1 victory at Famalicão thanks to Martínez's double.
- The Dragons then held out for a 1-1 draw at Marítimo on 22 August before returning to winning ways with a 3-0 home triumph against Arouca.
- Goalkeeper Agustín Marchesín had surgery on his right knee on 19 August and was expected to be sidelined for at least a month.
- Pepe became the oldest player to play an official match for Porto in the first round of this season's Portuguese Liga. The Dragons' captain was aged 38 years 163 days when they beat Belenenses on 8 August, eclipsing the record of former goalkeeper Silvino.
- The draw at Sporting was Sérgio Conceição's 33rd successive Portuguese Liga match without defeat, the third longest run for a Porto coach behind Bobby Robson (53 matches) and Vítor Pereira (43).
- Otávio marked his debut for Portugal with a goal in the 3-1 friendly win against Qatar on 4 September.
- Fábio Vieira scored the only goal from the penalty spot in Portugal's home win against Belarus on 6 September in their first 2023 UEFA European Under-21 Championship qualifier.
- Mehdi Taremi scored Iran's second goal in a 3-0 away win against Iraq on 7 September. The striker, who also provided an assist, has already scored five goals in qualifying for the 2022 FIFA World Cup.
- Díaz won the penalty for Colombia's first goal against Chile before scoring his team's third in a 3-1 World Cup qualifying win on 9 September.
- Díaz played a key role as Colombia clinched third place at the Copa América in Brazil during June and July, the winger scoring twice against Peru in a 3-2 win, including the decider in injury time.
- Jesús Corona's equaliser earned Mexico a 1-1 draw in Panama in World Cup qualifying on 9 September.

### UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

#### Overall records

- Chelsea in 2012/13 are the only defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage). In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and lost 4-3 on aggregate in the second round to CSKA Moskva.
- In 2016/17 Real Madrid became the first team to successfully defend the UEFA Champions League trophy, with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the previous club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- Real Madrid then made it three wins in a row in 2017/18, becoming the fourth club to win three or more successive titles in European Cup history, and the first to do it twice.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern München were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- Bayern's victory against Paris Saint-Germain in the 2020 UEFA Champions League final was their 11th successive win in the competition (18 September 2019 to 23 August 2020), setting a new record that they extended to 15 before being held at Atlético de Madrid on Matchday 5 in 2020/21. Bayern themselves (2 April 2013 to 27 November 2013) and Real Madrid (23 April 2014 to 18 February 2015) jointly held the previous best with ten, one more than Barcelona's winning run between 18 September 2002 and 18 February 2003.

#### Group stage

- Barcelona have finished as group winners on 21 occasions, four more than Real Madrid and Bayern München and six more than Manchester United. Barça also hold the record for the most unbeaten group stage campaigns with 13, five more than Real Madrid.
- Seven teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain (1994/95), Spartak Moskva (1995/96), Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage), Real Madrid (2011/12 and 2014/15) and Bayern (2019/20).
- Twenty-one teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, most recently AEK Athens in 2018/19.
- In 2017/18, Paris Saint-Germain set a new group stage record by scoring 25 goals, one more than Bayern München managed in 2019/20. Liverpool are next on the list having scored 23 in 2017/18 with Borussia Dortmund hitting 21 in 2016/17. Manchester United (1998/99), Barcelona (2011/12, 2016/17) and Real Madrid (2013/14) all managed 20.
- Only Deportivo La Coruña (2004/05), Maccabi Haifa (2009/10) and Dinamo Zagreb (2016/17) have failed to score in a group stage.
- BATE Borisov conceded 24 goals in 2014/15, a new group stage record which was matched by Legia Warszawa in 2016/17. The previous mark, 22, was held by Dinamo Zagreb (2011/12) and Nordsjælland (2012/13).
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea (2005/06), Liverpool (2005/06), Villarreal (2005/06), Manchester United (2010/11), Monaco (2014/15), Paris Saint-Germain (2015/16), Barcelona (2017/18) and Manchester City (2020/21) all let in just one.
- Matchday 6 of 2013/14 marked FCSB's 23rd successive game in the competition without a victory, surpassing the previous record of 22 set by Spartak Moskva between December 2000 and November 2006.
- Marseille hold the record for successive defeats in the competition, group stage to final, having lost 13 in a row between March 2012 and November 2020. The 2-0 loss at home to Porto on Matchday 4 of the 2020/21 competition surpassed Anderlecht's previous competition record of 12 losses in a row between December 2003 and November 2005. Dinamo Zagreb are next with 11 consecutive losses on two occasions, from September 2011 to November 2012 and September 2015 to December 2016.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is six points: Zenit in 2013/14 and Roma in 2015/16. Since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, ten teams have made it through with seven points: Legia Warszawa (1995/96), Dynamo Kyiv (1999/2000), Liverpool (2001/02, second group stage), Lokomotiv Moskva (2002/03, first group stage) and eventual finalists Juventus (2002/03, second group stage), Rangers and Werder

Bremen (2005/06), Galatasaray (2013/14), Basel (2014/15) and Atalanta (2019/20).

- Napoli failed to qualify from their group with 12 points in 2013/14, the highest total of any team not to reach the next stage when the top two in each section progressed. Dynamo Kyiv (1999/2000, second group stage), Borussia Dortmund (2002/03, second group stage), PSV Eindhoven (2003/04), Olympiacos and Dynamo Kyiv (both 2004/05), Werder Bremen (2006/07), Manchester City (2011/12), Chelsea and Cluj (both 2012/13), Benfica (2013/14), Porto (2015/16) and Ajax (2019/20) all missed out with ten points.

### Goalscoring records

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer Leverkusen on 7 March 2012, a feat matched by Shakhtar Donetsk's Luiz Adriano at BATE Borisov on 21 October 2014. Fourteen more players, also including Messi and Robert Lewandowski twice, have scored four times in a game, most recently Olivier Giroud for Chelsea at Sevilla in the 2020/21 group stage. That was the fourth quadruple in succession to be scored away from home after Bayern's Serge Gnabry and Lewandowski (group stage v Tottenham and Crvena zvezda respectively) and Josip Iličić (Atalanta v Valencia, round of 16 second leg) all achieved the feat in 2019/20.

- Cristiano Ronaldo set a new record for a UEFA Champions League group stage with 11 goals in 2015/16, Lionel Messi got ten goals in 2016/17, a figure matched by Robert Lewandowski in 2019/20; Ronaldo (2013/14, 2017/18) and Luiz Adriano (2014/15) scored nine while Zlatan Ibrahimović (2013/14), Ruud van Nistelrooy (2004/05), Filippo Inzaghi, Hernán Crespo (both 2002/03), Lewandowski (2018/19) and Erling Braut Haaland (2019/20) all managed eight.

- Messi's hat-trick against PSV Eindhoven on Matchday 1 of the 2018/19 competition was his eighth in the competition, a mark Ronaldo matched against Atlético de Madrid in that season's round of 16 second leg.

### Oldest and youngest players

- Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having featured against Real Madrid on Matchday 6 in 2007/08 aged 43 years 252 days. Alessandro Costacurta is the oldest outfield player; the Milan defender was 40 years and 211 days when he played against AEK Athens in 2006/07.

- Francesco Totti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 38 years 59 days, in Roma's 1-1 draw at CSKA Moskva on 25 November 2014. Ryan Giggs (37 years 290 days) was the previous record holder.

- Youssoufa Moukoko is the youngest player to have appeared, aged 16 years 18 days for Borussia Dortmund at Zenit on 8 December 2020. He replaced Celestine Babayaro, who was 16 years 87 days when he started for Anderlecht against Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994; Babayaro was sent off in the 37th minute.

- Ansu Fati's winner for Barcelona at Inter on Matchday 6 in 2019/20 made him the youngest goalscorer in UEFA Champions League history, at the age of 17 years 40 days. He eclipsed the previous record of Olympiacos's Peter Ofori-Quaye (17 years 195 days) that had lasted since 1 October 1997.
