Match background

Holders Chelsea are well placed to reach the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals again as they travel to northern France to take on LOSC Lille defending a 2-0 first-leg lead.

- A goal in each half from Kai Havertz (8) and Christian Puljić (63) put Chelsea in control of the tie and left LOSC – who have now lost their last four games against Premier League clubs – needing their biggest home win against English opponents to stay in the competition.
- While Chelsea are at this stage for the 16th time, LOSC's only previous last-16 tie came in 2006/07, when their challenge was ended by home and away defeats against English opposition.
- The French champions, however, impressed in finishing first in a tight Group G this season, while Chelsea let top spot in Group H slip out of their hands on Matchday 6 and had to be content with the runners-up berth behind Juventus.

Previous meetings

- Chelsea beat LOSC 2-1 away and at home in the 2019/20 UEFA Champions League group stage, those six points helping the Blues finish second in Group H on 11 with LOSC eliminated in fourth on one point.
- Frank Lampard's Chelsea were victorious at the Stade Pierre Mauroy on Matchday 2 thanks to Willian's winner 12 minutes from time after Tammy Abraham's 22nd-minute opener was cancelled out 11 minutes later by Victor Osimhen.
- Abraham also opened the scoring at Stamford Bridge on Matchday 6, in the 19th minute; César Azpilicueta made it 2-0 (35), with a 78th-minute reply from former Chelsea striker Loïc Rémy all Christophe Galtier's LOSC could manage.

Form guide

LOSC

- LOSC took only two points from their first three Group G games but won the next three, a 3-1 victory at Wolfsburg on Matchday 6 securing progress as group winners.
- The French side won only one of their three home games, but did keep three clean sheets, beating Salzburg 1-0 on Matchday 5 after 0-0 draws against Wolfsburg and Sevilla.
- This season was LOSC's seventh UEFA Champions League group stage campaign, but just their second in the past nine seasons. Only one of those previous six campaigns extended into the knockout phase.
- Les Dogues' last appearance came in 2019/20, when they finished bottom of a section that also included Valencia, Chelsea and Ajax. LOSC lost five of their six games, the exception a 1-1 draw at home to Valencia on Matchday 3.
- In 2020/21, LOSC's European campaign began in the UEFA Europa League group stage, where they finished second in their section behind AC Milan on 11 points, recording a notable 3-0 away win against the Rossoneri to help them finish above Sparta Praha and Celtic.
- LOSC's campaign was ended by Ajax in the round of 32, the Amsterdam club winning 2-1 in both France and the Netherlands.
- The 2-1 win in Seville on Matchday 4 ended LOSC's ten-match run without a victory in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final (D3 L7).
- The 1-0 win against Salzburg in the penultimate round of group games ended LOSC's 13-game run without a home victory in the UEFA Champions League proper (D6 L7).
- That was also only LOSC's second victory in their last 19 home European matches (D9 L8), the other a 2-1 defeat of Sparta on Matchday 5 of last season's UEFA Europa League.
- LOSC are in the round of 16 for only the second time, the first, in 2006/07, having ended in defeat against English opponents as Manchester United won 1-0 away and at home.
- LOSC's record in two-legged knockout ties against English clubs is W1 L2, the most recent contest against Liverpool in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League round of 16 (1-0 h, 0-3 a). The sole success came against Aston Villa in the 2002 UEFA Intertoto Cup semi-finals, a 2-0 away second-leg win completing a 3-1 aggregate triumph.
- At home, LOSC have won two of their seven games against English visitors (D3 L2), both 1-0; the 2019 loss to Chelsea is their only defeat, and sole goals conceded, in their new stadium against Premier League opponents (W1 D1). The first-leg victory against Liverpool in 2010 is their only win in nine games, home and away (D1 L7).
- LOSC won their only UEFA competition tie in which they lost the away first leg, turning round a 1-0 defeat at Copenhagen with a 2-0 home win in the 2012/13 UEFA Europa League play-offs.

- LOSC have yet to feature in a UEFA penalty shoot-out.

Chelsea

- The Blues looked set to take first place in Group H heading into the final round of matches after a 4-0 win at home to Juventus in their penultimate fixture had made it three victories from three at Stamford Bridge in this season's competition, and gave the English club the head-to-head advantage over their Italian rivals following a 1-0 defeat in Turin. However, a Zenit goal four minutes into added time earned a 3-3 draw that left Chelsea on 13 points, two behind Juventus. The holders' only away victory in the section came at Malmö (1-0) on Matchday 4.
- Chelsea claimed their second UEFA Champions League title in 2020/21 by beating Manchester City 1-0 in the all-English final at Porto's Estádio do Dragão on 29 May, Havertz scoring the only goal in the first half – his first strike in the competition.
- The Blues had made smooth progress through their section (W4 D2) to finish ahead of Sevilla, Krasnodar and Rennes.
- With Thomas Tuchel having replaced Lampard as head coach in January, Chelsea then eased past Atlético de Madrid in the round of 16, winning 1-0 in Bucharest before a 2-0 home victory, and held off Porto in the last eight (2-0 a, 0-1 h) with both matches played in Seville. Chelsea then got the better of Real Madrid in the semi-finals (1-1 a, 2-0 h) before claiming their second UEFA Champions League title against City.
- A 1-0 defeat at Juventus on Matchday 2 this season is one of only four in Chelsea's last 27 UEFA Champions League matches (W17 D6).
- That loss was also one of only two in Chelsea's last 20 away European games (W13 D5).
- Edouard Mendy kept nine clean sheets in 12 UEFA Champions League matches last season, the most in a campaign by a goalkeeper for an English side in the competition's history. He has added another five from his six appearances this term.
- Fourth in the Premier League in 2020/21 for the second season in a row, Chelsea are participating in their 18th UEFA Champions League campaign, and a fourth in five years. The exception came in 2018/19, when they won the UEFA Europa League under Maurizio Sarri.
- Tuchel's team have already claimed European silverware this season, beating Villarreal 6-5 on penalties after a 1-1 draw in the UEFA Super Cup in Belfast on 11 August. It was their first victory in the competition since 1998; they had lost in 2012, 2013 and 2019.
- Chelsea's record in the round of 16 is W9 L6. Last season's defeat of Atlético ended a run of four successive losses at this stage.
- The Blues have won only one of their four two-legged ties against French clubs, a sequence that includes defeats by Paris Saint-Germain at this stage of the UEFA Champions League in 2014/15 (1-1 a, 2-2 h aet) and 2015/16 (1-2 a, 1-2 h). Their sole aggregate knockout success against Ligue 1 opposition also came against Paris, in the 2013/14 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals (0-2 a, 3-1 h).
- Chelsea have won their last five games against French clubs, beating Rennes 3-0 at home – Timo Werner scoring twice from the penalty spot – and 2-1 away in last season's group stage, Callum Hudson-Odoi finding the net in France. The first leg of this tie made it six victories in their last 12 games against French clubs, home and away (D2 L4).
- Last season's win at Rennes was only Chelsea's third in ten away matches in France (D2 L5).
- The Blues have won 12 of the 16 previous UEFA ties after a first-leg home victory, most recently against Dynamo Kyiv in the round of 16 of their triumphant 2018/19 UEFA Europa League campaign (3-0 h, 5-0 a). Their sole previous 2-0 home first-leg victory came against Slovan Bratislava in the 1997/98 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup first round (2-0 a), a competition they went on to win.
- The last team to eliminate Chelsea after they had won the first leg at Stamford Bridge were Liverpool on penalties in the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League semi-finals (1-0 h, 0-1 a). They have since prevailed in two UEFA Champions League ties after first-leg home wins, against Juventus in the 2008/09 round of 16 and Barcelona in the 2011/12 semi-finals (both 1-0 h, 2-2 a).

Links and trivia

- Tuchel was in charge of Paris Saint-Germain from July 2018 to December 2020, winning two Ligue 1 titles, one Coupe de France and one Coupe de la Ligue. He also took Paris to the 2020 UEFA Champions League final.
- Tuchel took on LOSC five times with Paris, all in Ligue 1, with the record W3 D1 L1. The sole defeat was a 5-1 away loss on 14 April 2019, a result that delayed Paris's title celebrations, while a 0-0 draw at LOSC on 20 December 2020 was his penultimate game in charge.
- Tuchel and LOSC coach Jocelyn Gourvennec crossed paths twice in French football, both matches in January 2019. Gourvennec's Guingamp were 2-1 winners at Paris in the Coupe de la Ligue on 9 January; ten days later, Paris won 9-0 at the Parc des Princes, their biggest home win in Ligue 1.

- Thiago Silva won seven Ligue 1 titles, five Coupes de France and six Coupes de la Ligue with Paris. His record against LOSC was W9 L1, the sole defeat that 5-1 reverse at the Stade Pierre Mauroy on 14 April 2019 in which Jonathan Bamba and José Fonte were on the scoresheet.
- Thiago Silva's team-mates at Paris included Timothy Weah (2018/19).
- Mendy drew four of his five games against LOSC with Reims and Rennes, losing the other and failing to keep a clean sheet. Fonte scored past Mendy in LOSC's 1-1 draw at Reims on 7 April 2019.
- Mendy's final Rennes appearance before joining Chelsea was a 1-1 draw at LOSC on 22 August 2020 in which Bamba got the home side's goal.

- Former Chelsea midfielder Eden Hazard came through the ranks at LOSC, whom he joined aged 14 in 2005. He made his first-team debut in October 2007 and inspired the club to a league and cup double in 2010/11, when he was named Ligue 1's player of the year. He joined Chelsea in 2012 having again picked up the Ligue 1 player prize and won two Premier League titles, one FA Cup, one League Cup plus the 2012/13 and 2018/19 UEFA Europa League during his seven years in west London.
- Joe Cole also played for both clubs, representing Chelsea from 2003 to 2010 and being loaned to LOSC by Liverpool in 2011/12.

- Hatem Ben Arfa made his 50th appearance in UEFA club competition in the first leg.
- LOSC won their first two Ligue 1 games after the first-leg loss at Chelsea, 1-0 at Lyon on 27 February and 4-0 at home to Clermont on 6 March, before being held 0-0 at home by St-Étienne on Friday.
- That made it five successive clean sheets in the league, since a 5-1 loss at home to league leaders Paris Saint-

Germain on 6 February.

- That loss to Paris ended LOSC's 13-match unbeaten home run in all competitions (W7 D6). They have since drawn 0-0 against Metz and St-Étienne either side of beating Clermont.
- A 2-0 Ligue 1 defeat at Brest on 22 January ended the French champions' 14-match unbeaten run in all competitions (W8 D6).
- LOSC had kept two successive clean sheets in all competitions for the first time this season before their defeat at Chelsea. Those are the only goals they have conceded in their last six matches.
- Edon Zhegrova, who joined LOSC in January, made his second appearance for the club as a substitute against Metz on 18 February; he came on in the 81st minute but was sent off in added time, the first red card of his professional career.
- Zhegrova returned to Ligue 1 action against Clermont, scoring his first goal for LOSC. That meant the club's last eight Ligue 1 scorers are from eight different countries: Mozambique (Reinildo Mandava), Netherlands (Sven Botman), Portugal (Xeka), Sweden (Gabriel Gudmundsson), France (Jonathan Bamba), Canada (Jonathan David), Turkey (Zeki Çelik) and Kosovo (Zhegrova).
- David's goal against Clermont was his 13th in Ligue 1 this season but his first for eight matches.
- Gudmundsson got his first goal for LOSC at Lyon while Bamba and Zeki Çelik opened their accounts in Ligue 1 this season against Clermont.
- On 4 January, LOSC went out of the French Cup in the round of 32, going down 4-3 on penalties at local rivals Lens after a 2-2 draw, a game in which Amadou Onana's double had given the visitors a two-goal lead. José Fonte and Renato Sanches missed in the shoot-out.
- On 19 January, LOSC scored three goals in the space of 21 minutes to secure a 3-1 league win against Lorient; it was their fastest three-goal haul in Ligue 1 for nine seasons.
- Fonte has played all 2,520 minutes of LOSC's 2021/22 league campaign; he is the only player in Ligue 1 to have been on the field for every minute this season. He has also played every minute of every LOSC game this season in all competitions.
- David scored 11 goals in his last 15 matches of 2021 for club and country, including one in each of the last three UEFA Champions League group games, but had to wait for his ninth appearance to find the net for LOSC in 2022, although he scored twice and provided an assist in three 2022 FIFA World Cup qualifiers with Canada.
- Angel Gomes had to be replaced in the first half against Metz due to injury. He was an unused replacement in LOSC's next two games before returning as a late substitute against Clermont.
- Renato Sanches went off midway through the first half against St-Étienne having suffered a hamstring injury.
- Benjamin André missed Friday's game due to illness.
- Eighteen-year-old forward José Bica, who scored three UEFA Youth League goals in the autumn, signed his first professional contract with LOSC on 5 January.

- Antonio Rüdiger has made 49 appearances in UEFA club competition.
- Chelsea are unbeaten since the first leg against LOSC (W4 D1) although the draw, 0-0 against Liverpool at Wembley in the League Cup final on 27 February, preceded an 11-10 defeat on penalties.
- Substitute goalkeeper Kepa was the only one of the 22 players to miss in the shoot-out, firing the final kick over the crossbar.
- Chelsea reached the FA Cup quarter-finals with a 3-2 win at Luton on 2 March. They will visit another Championship club, Middlesbrough, in the last eight on 19 March.
- Kai Havertz scored twice in a 4-0 Premier League victory at Burnley on 5 March and was also on target in a 3-1 win at Norwich five days later. He got the only goal at home to Newcastle on Sunday, making it six in his last seven Chelsea appearances.
- A 1-0 loss at Premier League leaders Manchester City on 15 January is Chelsea's only defeat in their last 23 games in all competitions (W15 D7).

- That draw against Liverpool in the League Cup final is the only one of Chelsea's last 11 matches in all competitions they have failed to win.
- The Blues have kept five clean sheets in their last seven games.
- A 2-1 extra-time win against Brazilian side Palmeiras on 12 February gave Chelsea the FIFA Club World Cup for the first time, Havertz getting the decisive goal from the penalty spot in the 117th minute. Romelu Lukaku had scored Chelsea's opener having also got the only goal in the semi-final win against Al-Hilal of Saudi Arabia.
- Mason Mount suffered an ankle ligament injury in the win against Palmeiras while Reece James was sidelined by a hamstring injury from 29 December; both returned in the League Cup final, although James suffered muscular problems in his other leg after the win at Burnley and missed the wins at Norwich and against Newcastle.
- César Azpilicueta was withdrawn at half-time against Norwich due to illness and sat out the win against Newcastle, with Christian Pulišić missing the former match for the same reason.
- Callum Hudson-Odoi, whose last appearance came on 2 March, has a calf injury.
- Ben Chilwell is expected to miss the rest of the season after suffering a ruptured cruciate ligament on 23 November.
- On 17 January Tuchel was named Best FIFA Men's Coach for 2021, with Mendy taking the goalkeeper's award. Emma Hayes, Chelsea women's head coach, took the women's coach prize.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League : Did you know?

Overall records

- Chelsea in 2012/13 are the only defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage). In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and lost 4-3 on aggregate in the second round to CSKA Moskva.
- In 2016/17 Real Madrid became the first team to successfully defend the UEFA Champions League trophy, with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the previous club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- Real Madrid then made it three wins in a row in 2017/18, becoming the fourth club to win three or more successive titles in European Cup history, and the first to do it twice.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern München were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- Bayern's victory against Paris Saint-Germain in the 2020 UEFA Champions League final was their 11th successive win in the competition (18 September 2019 to 23 August 2020), setting a new record that they extended to 15 before being held at Atlético de Madrid on Matchday 5 in 2020/21. Bayern themselves (2 April 2013 to 27 November 2013) and Real Madrid (23 April 2014 to 18 February 2015) jointly held the previous best with ten, one more than Barcelona's winning run between 18 September 2002 and 18 February 2003.

UEFA Champions League knockout stage

- Real Madrid have qualified for the UEFA Champions League knockout phase a record 26 times, including 25 in succession. The first leg of their 2020/21 round of 16 tie against Atalanta was their 100th knockout match in the competition; they have now played 105 knockout games, ahead of Bayern München (100) and Barcelona (97).
- Teams have overturned a first-leg deficit to go through 49 times, including six in 2018/19 – a competition record for a single season – and Paris Saint-Germain in the 2019/20 round of 16.
- Before 2018/19, only twice – Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos in the 1995/96 semi-finals and Internazionale's victory against Bayern in the 2010/11 round of 16 – had a side progressed after a home first-leg loss. However, Ajax again (against Real Madrid) and Manchester United (against Paris Saint-Germain) both achieved the feat in the 2018/19 round of 16 before Tottenham (against Ajax) did likewise in the semi-finals.
- The biggest losing margin a side has overhauled was achieved by Barcelona against Paris in the 2016/17 last 16, when they lost 4-0 away but progressed thanks to a 6-1 home success. That eclipsed the previous record held by Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals, when they went down 4-1 at AC Milan but won 4-0 at home; Roma equalled that margin in the 2017/18 quarter-finals, turning round a 4-1 first-leg loss at Barcelona with a 3-0 home success, while in the 2018/19 semi-finals Liverpool lost 3-0 in the first leg at Barcelona but went through after a 4-0 home victory.
- Thirty-six ties have been decided on away goals, including 13 where the triumphant team lost the first leg. Bayern and Monaco have benefited from the away goals rule five times – more than any other club – whereas Inter have been eliminated by that method a record four times.
- In all, 31 ties have required extra time. Fifteen have been settled by extra time alone: eight round of 16 encounters including Porto-Juventus in 2020/21, five quarter-finals, the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea and Liverpool, and the 2013/14 final between Real Madrid and Atlético.
- Sixteen ties have gone to penalties, including seven finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008, 2012 and 2016. The first two-legged tie decided on spot kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 victory over Lyon on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw, still the only quarter-final to go to penalties. Bayern, Chelsea and Atlético have all appeared in three shoot-outs, sharing the competition record, with Bayern, Atlético and Liverpool having won the most (two apiece).
- The 2015/16 round of 16 tie between Atlético and PSV was the first to finish goalless after two legs. Thirteen have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Real Madrid's defeat of Manchester City in the 2015/16 semi-finals.
- Liverpool (versus Porto) and Bayern (versus Beşiktaş) both won 5-0 in the 2017/18 round of 16, equalling the knockout phase record for the biggest first-leg lead – Real Madrid's 6-1 victory at Schalke in 2013/14 and Bayern's 5-0 success at Sporting CP in 2008/09, both also in the round of 16.

- Bayern eventually beat Sporting by a record aggregate margin of 12-1 after a 7-1 stroll in the home second leg; that tie also featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any UEFA Champions League knockout tie until it was equalled by Liverpool's 7-6 aggregate win against Roma in the 2017/18 semi-final.
- Bayern and Manchester City jointly hold the record for the largest margin of victory in a UEFA Champions League knockout match. Bayern beat both Basel (2011/12) and Shakhtar Donetsk (2014/15) 7-0 in the round of 16 second leg, while City beat Schalke by the same scoreline at the same stage of the 2018/19 competition.
- A record five clubs from England participated in the 2017/18 knockout phase. Including 2021/22, England has also provided four clubs on nine other occasions – as has Spain six times and Germany three. England is the only nation to have provided four quarter-finalists in a season, 2018/19 being the third occasion after 2007/08 and 2008/09.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to have lifted the European Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win it three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) and Zinedine Zidane (2016, 2017, 2018) have replicated.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburg 1983), José Mourinho (Porto 2004, Internazionale 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.

Goalscoring records

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer Leverkusen on 7 March 2012, a feat matched by Shakhtar Donetsk's Luiz Adriano at BATE Borisov on 21 October 2014. Fifteen more players, also including Messi and Robert Lewandowski twice, have scored four times in a game, most recently Sébastien Haller for Ajax at Sporting CP on Matchday 1 in 2021/22. That was the fifth quadruple in succession to be scored away from home after Bayern's Serge Gnabry and Lewandowski (group stage v Tottenham and Crvena zvezda respectively) and Josip Iličić (Atalanta v Valencia, round of 16 second leg) all achieved the feat in 2019/20 and Olivier Giroud did likewise for Chelsea at Sevilla in the 2020/21 group stage.
- Cristiano Ronaldo has scored 67 goals in the UEFA Champions League knockout rounds, more than any other player. Messi is second on 49 goals, ahead of Lewandowski (26), Thomas Müller (24), Karim Benzema (20), Raúl González and Andriy Shevchenko (both 18).
- Cristiano Ronaldo set a new record for a UEFA Champions League group stage with 11 goals in 2015/16, Messi got ten goals in 2016/17, a figure matched by Robert Lewandowski in 2019/20 and Sébastien Haller in 2021/22; Ronaldo (2013/14, 2017/18), Luiz Adriano (2014/15) and Lewandowski (2021/22) scored nine while Zlatan Ibrahimović (2013/14), Ruud van Nistelrooy (2004/05), Filippo Inzaghi, Hernán Crespo (both 2002/03), Lewandowski (2018/19) and Erling Braut Haaland (2019/20) all managed eight.
- Messi's hat-trick against PSV Eindhoven on Matchday 1 of the 2018/19 competition was his eighth in the competition, a mark Ronaldo matched against Atlético de Madrid in that season's round of 16 second leg.

Oldest and youngest players

- Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having featured against Real Madrid on Matchday 6 in 2007/08 aged 43 years 252 days. Alessandro Costacurta is the oldest outfield player; the Milan defender was 40 years and 211 days when he played against AEK Athens in 2006/07.
- Francesco Totti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 38 years 59 days, in Roma's 1-1 draw at CSKA Moskva on 25 November 2014. Ryan Giggs (37 years 290 days) was the previous record holder.
- Youssoufa Moukoko is the youngest player to have appeared, aged 16 years 18 days for Borussia Dortmund at Zenit on 8 December 2020. He replaced Celestine Babayaro, who was 16 years 87 days when he started for Anderlecht against Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994; Babayaro was sent off in the 37th minute.
- Ansu Fati's winner for Barcelona at Inter on Matchday 6 in 2019/20 made him the youngest goalscorer in UEFA Champions League history, at the age of 17 years 40 days. He eclipsed the previous record of Olympiacos's Peter Ofori-Quaye (17 years 195 days) that had lasted since 1 October 1997.
